

DEACCESSION FORM

The Society of the Four Arts acquires objects for retention in the collection and not with the intent of removal. Over time, however, the Four Arts may deem it necessary to remove or "deaccession" objects from the collection. Deaccessioning is conducted with the same level of prudence as the acquisition process and accessioning and serves to ensure the integrity of the collection is not impaired but is in fact enhanced by the removal of objects. The decision-making process will consider the best interests of the Four Arts, the public trust it represents, the public it serves, and the scholarly and academic communities in which it engages.

This Deaccession Form sets forth the terms and conditions for the work(s) listed below to be removed from the permanent art collection of The Society of the Four Arts. All documentation about the deaccessioned work(s) will be retained in Collection Records.
